

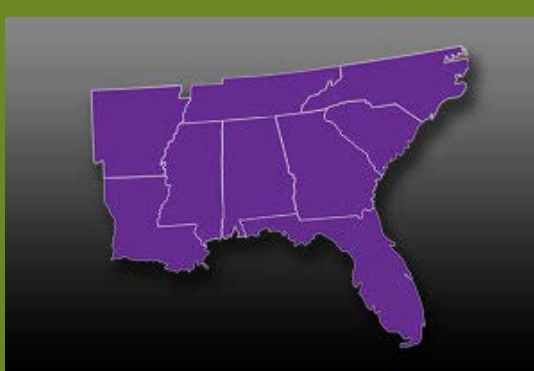
REGIONAL UPDATES

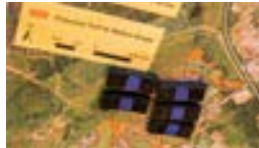
