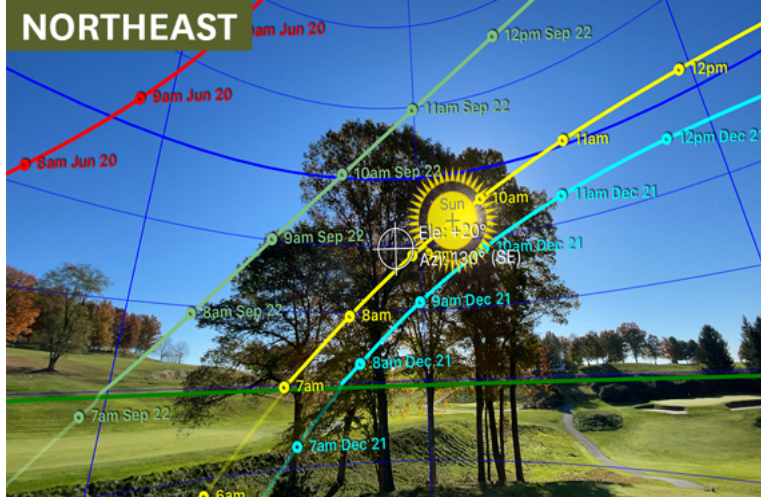


Palm Tree Roots Creep Farther Than You Think
