

Prolonged droughts, rising water costs and the risk of water restrictions has many courses in warm or dry areas thinking about converting fairways to bermudagrass. These projects require a significant investment and some disruption to the golf schedule but the cost savings, improved playability and resistance to drought damage are significant benefits. 


