Managing Mower Setup to Achieve Quality Putting Surfaces

Golf courses, by and large, are judged based on the condition of their putting greens. Every golfer enjoys putting on uniform surfaces that roll true.



A dense, healthy stand of turfgrass that is smooth and consistent should be the goal for all golf facilities, regardless of budget. Some may think that golf courses operating on a shoestring budget do not have the resources to produce and maintain quality putting surfaces – this is not necessarily true. All golf courses can maintain smooth surfaces for golfers to enjoy when the agronomic staff makes a commitment to quality. Part of that commitment is recognizing that equipment setup can have a significant impact on the most fundamental practice of maintaining quality putting surfaces, proper mowing.
